Colour of Egrets' Bills.—At the R.A.O.U. Camp-Out on "Bullerana" Station (Moree) in October, 1933, all the White Egrets (Egretta alba) that came under my notice had black bills. In an experience of over twenty years of the bird in Queensland the bill has always been yellow. A suggestion was made by the ornithologists present that the black bill might be a breeding phase of the bird* In vol. XXII, plate IX, of The Emu, a photograph by Mr. F. C. Morse (from the same locality) shows Egretta alba with nest and young birds—and the adult bird's bill is certainly yellow. On a recent visit to Taronga Park I observed in the aviary the Little Egret (Egretta garzetta) with a yellow bill. My only knowledge of that bird in Queensland is with a black bill.—L. M.
