Skylarks Made Drunk.—I append the following extract from the Brisbane Sunday Mail, of May 20, 1934:—

"Bird-singing competitions, in which Sky-Larks in darkened cages are made drunk until they begin to sing, were condemned by Eric Parker, authority on bird life, at a meeting organized by the Royal Society for the Protection of Birds and the University of London Animal Welfare Society, says a London message.

"The method of making Sky-Larks sing is to give them wireworms soaked in old Scotch whisky," Parker said. "The birds are fed in covered cages until they begin to sing, and they do not sing until they are drunk."
