Meliornis niger. White-cheeked Honeyeater.

In a thick patch of Melaleuca megacephala near Balline homestead, one pair was noted.

Corvus coronoides. Raven.

At the Murchison River two birds not quite fully fledged were examined and identified as this species.

Strepera versicolor. Grey Currawong.

An individual was observed at the lower Gingin Brook, and another at Balline. Between Geraldton and Dongara, it was sparsely distributed.

SUMMARY

The discovery of Eopsaltria georgiana (= Quoyornis georgianus) in dense Acacia thickets between Geraldton and Dongara, some 200 miles north of its previously-known limit,

was the highlight of our field excursion.

Additions to the Murchison River embouchure bird list are: Geopelia cuneata, Erythrogonys cinctus, Charadrius leschenaultii, Tringa brevipes, Pyrrholaemus brunneus and Artamus personatus. Thus, together with Sedgwick's (1949) list and Buller's (1950) observations, 139 species have been recorded in this locality.

The known ranges of Porzana fluminea and Charadrius cucullatus were extended to Hutt Lagoon and Port Gregory

respectively.
