Arctic Tern: second Victorian record.—On October 1, 1960, a well-weathered skeleton of a tern was picked up on Somers Beach. It was subsequently identified by A. R. McEvey as an Arctic Tern, Sterna macrura, and was sent to K. A. Hindwood for confirmation. Hindwood supported McEvey's conclusion and the bird is registered B 7380 in the National Museum of Victoria. This constitutes a second record for Victoria. The first was found dead on a hill overlooking Lake Purrumbete, near Camperdown, on December 13, 1953 (Morgan, Emu 54: 58-9, 1954).
