Birds eating charcoal.—The birds mentioned by Mollison and Green (Emu 61: 277-80) could have been after charcoal to eat. I have recently seen four different species take charcoal near my home in north-western New South Wales.

On October 9, 1962, Fairy Martins, Hylochelidon ariel, were observed freely dust-bathing in ashes and picking at charcoal. On February 9, 1964, several Fairy Martins flew low over a newlycut lawn and came down to rest on the ground, where they gathered injured moths and ate charcoal from an ash mulch around fruit trees. Next day, at 6 p.m., one bird was seen to take a piece of charcoal the size of a small pea.

On January 5, 1963 a Dusky Wood-Swallow, Artamus cyanopterus, took a small piece of charcoal and flew away. Again on December 29, 1963, several of these birds were seen eating charcoal.

On June 9, 1963, Banded Finches, Steganopleura bichenovii, and on May 5, 1964, Zebra Finches, Taeniopygia castanotis, were seen eating charcoal.—Mrs M. BALDWIN, Gwydir Park, via Auburn Vale, Inverell, N.S.W.
