Plover, be dropped until sufficient field data are available to pass critical judgment on their validity.

ADVICE TO EMU CONTRIBUTORS

Contributors to the *Emu* are urged to study carefully the style used in the journal and to ensure that their contributions follow this style.

In MSS., italics are indicated by a single underlining of the words to be italicised, e.g. Eopsaltria. All generic, specific, and sub-specific names, where used, are italicised, the names of families and orders are not. Where a scientific name is used following a vernacular name, it is surrounded by commas, not brackets. Titles of Books and Journals are also italicised.

Bold type is indicated by a double underlining of the words to be set in this form. Paper titles are set in bold Roman capitals, Stray Feather titles in bold Roman lower case.

Except for the heading "Summary" which is set in italics, all other main headings are in Roman capitals, not bold. Sub-headings are set in bold lower case. In annotated bird lists it is Emu practice to put the common name first in bold lower case, followed by a comma and the scientific name in italics.

For Australian birds the scientific names used MUST be those of the current R.A.O.U. Checklist as amended to date except in taxonomic papers proposing changes or in special cases which must be approved by Council. Where use of names other than those of the *Checklist* is necessary in a paper they must always be linked with the *Checklist* names. Vernacular names should be those approved by Council, at present those of the *Checklist*. For birds which do not occur in Australia the names in current use in the countries where they do occur should be used.

Only material typed in double-spacing, and with ample margins on either side can be considered by the Editor. Carbon copies and hand-written material are not acceptable. Either quarto or foolscap paper should be used.

All photographs submitted should be on glossy paper and should have their captions written lightly in pencil, or typed on separate slips of paper firmly fixed on their backs. The name of the paper and of its author should also appear on the back of each. Drawings, graphs, etc. should be in Indian ink, and should carry a similar caption slip to that required for photographs. All lettering on drawings and graphs must be completed. Additional art work can no longer be arranged by the Editor.

References begin with the surname of the author, followed by his initials, the year of publication, the name of the journal in italics, number of the volume in bold figures, followed by a colon and the page numbers. If books are cited the title of the book should be in italics, followed by the name of the publisher and the city of publication.

Compliance with this advice will save the Editor much unnecessary work. He looks hopefully to the day when he can put together a complete issue of the *Emu* without having to make alterations to the MSS. which comprise it.
