The *Proceedings* is now indexed in Elsevier's Scopus and has a CiteScore, which measures average citations received per document published in the serial. Scopus indexes 22,000 journals. The journal is also being digitised for the Biodiversity Heritage Library.

The Society invites original research articles, reviews and short communications for the Proceedings, from authors across the various disciplines of biological, physical and earth sciences, including multidisciplinary research, and on issues concerning technology and the applied sciences. Contributions on topics that are relevant to Victoria and the south-eastern Australian region are particularly encouraged. All contributions are subject to peer review and there are no page or colour charges involved.

Manuscript submission change

From Volume 136 in 2024, the *Proceedings of the Royal Society of Victoria* will be adopting the online journal management system ScholarOne Manuscripts. ScholarOne is the leading system for managing the submission and peer review process for scholarly journals, with over 13 million registered users across the research enterprise, making it familiar to many authors who may potentially submit to the Journal.

We fully realise that a number of our potential authors will either be unfamiliar with ScholarOne or reluctant to use it, preferring the traditional method of submitting manuscripts. Others in the academic world will be quite used to it. Be assured that assistance will be available to help authors manage this change.

FOREWORD

Alexander von Humboldt has been referred to as 'the forgotten father of environmentalism'. As early as 1844, he wrote that humans change the climate 'by cutting down forests, by changing the distribution of water bodies, and through the production of large vapor and gas masses at the centers of industry'. Humboldt also described the greenhouse effect in his *opus magnum*, 'Kosmos'. And time and again in his writings and in his lectures, he emphasised the interconnectedness of all living creatures on this planet. In times when the effects of climate change become ever more visible and palpable around the globe, it is imperative that the global academic community addresses the topic of sustainability in all its dimensions.
