 - a. Fun and welcoming- that the kids enjoy coming to the service or program
 - b. Safety if they have to leave their children, that they will be safe
 - c. Consistency that the service/program will provide the same quality of service
 - d. Knowledge that they and their children can learn something, not only about health but with broader programs about their culture
 - i. What are your thoughts on these outcomes?

 - e. People using programs feel confident that their needs will be met
 - f. Trusting relationship with program participant so they are able to tell them their story
 - g. That participants in the programs and services feel supported
 - i. What are your thoughts on these outcomes?
- 9. What other factors do you think contribute significantly to a decision to fund or allocate resources to a new program or to decisions to continue to fund or discontinue an existing program?
 - h. Can you tell me why you think these factors are so important?
